## Davis High Community Council Minutes January 6, 2016

Attendees: Diana Anderson, Richard Swanson, Brad Chapple, Alan Porter, Ryan Wilko, Corine Barney, Dianna Barton, Gregg Laub, Kurt Cottrell, Amanda Grow, Allison Frazier, Barbara Hartmann, Dorothy Watkins, Marcie Hayes, Veronica Greenland, Andrea Richards, LeeAnn Hyer, Cade Hyde (student), Rachel Laub (student), Sam Sargent (student), McGyver Clark (student) and Carson Robb (student).

Diana Anderson welcomed the Community Council members and Dianna Barton read the minutes. Gregg Laub motioned to approve the minutes from December's meeting and Dorothy Watkins seconded the motion.

Mr. Swanson introduced DSD uses for the technology iBoss. It will be discussed further at the next meeting. He also noted that an updated budget is attached to the agenda for the Council to review.

Amanda Grow reported on the ACT Strategies class that was completed in November. The average number of test taking attempts of students that took her class was 2.1. There was a 1.4% increase in student's composite scores. Amanda presented information for a proposed class for Juniors in the Spring (to prepare for the March 1 test.)

- A question was asked as to the importance of taking a practice test at the beginning of Amanda's class – especially if students have previously taken the ACT. Amanda explained that being able to see the types of questions that the student is missing provides critical information to know specifically what type of help is needed.
- Amada shared the advantage of student having access, through Canvas, to the information learned in class. It is available, not only through the duration of the class, but throughout the school year.
- The Council discussed the possibility of offering an after school ACT Strategies class as well.
- For the upcoming test that all Juniors will be taking, Corine Barney suggested requiring a small fee to encourage student buy-in. (As opposed to the CC paying 100% of the fee.)

Alison Frazier made a motion proposing CC monies be used + \$15 student fee for the cost of the class. (A "scholarship" fee waiver will be available for students who qualify.) Dorothy Watkins seconded the motion.

The student body officers reported on the success of their Dash for Cash they held in December. \$5K was their goal. They raised \$14K. Overall, the total amount of money collected for donations was \$20,600. (\$5,600 over their goal!)

McGyver Clark presented his findings on pricing for emergency prep kit items. Grainger offered better pricing than tax-free government prices. It was suggested that he might incorporate the help of young men doing this as part of an Eagle Scout project. In total, \$7,750 was requested as "classroom supplies" for the emergency prep kits. Mr. Chappell confirmed that Trust Land funds cannot be used for such purposes. A suggestion was made that they ask for donations to cover some of the items or cost.

Cade Hyde reported on the SAEV coalition that is in full force District-wide. A kick-off meeting was held to organize school representatives. Calls and emails to state legislators are the biggest need right now.

Rachael Laub has developed an excellent website that was shown. It can be accessed at saevutah.com. It was suggested that a petition roll be available on the website. Cade Hyde named several things that he is requesting from the Community Council:

- Communicate with parents (via email and calls)
- Talk to other CCs
- Call/email legislators while in session
- Come to City Council Meetings, open forum to support the coalition on Jan, 7, 7:00PM
- Submit a written statement
- Look for business contacts such as the Utah Crime Council or other affiliations.
- Post Facebook links driving people to the website.

Diana Anderson proposed that the CC support the efforts of the student body officers and SAEV. Mr. Swanson seconded the motion. Diana Anderson is going to introduce the SAEV coalition at the DSD School Board meeting Jan, 12, 6:00PM. She also is going to look into having them present at the Tanner Clinic board meeting and Davis North Hospital board meeting.

Marcy Hayes asked how the parking permits were going to be distributed for second semester. Mr. Swanson indicated that he didn't think it would as much trouble as the beginning of the year because there is a higher standard required to obtain a parking pass – No Us or Fs, and all fees/fines must be paid in full. A question was asked what the parking pass funds are used for. Mr. Swanson explained that the money is used for general maintenance, signage, striping the lot and paying teachers to monitor and ticket vehicles in violation.

Gregg Laub motioned to adjourn the meeting. Kurt Cottrell seconded the motion.
